As the leaves fall away and we shift into the darkest time of year, I feel a stirring within. I have great memories of the Christmas season. As a child, the season was a time of great hope for me... the hope of getting lots of presents. And honestly for a kid, what is more wonderful than that? But it wasn't just that... it was also the beauty and magic of this time of year... the lights and the candy canes, the Christmas tree and, of course, Santa and his reindeer prancing on the roof on Christmas Eve.

East Trenton Community Learning Center Closer to Completion

Members of UUCP have made substantial progress in recent months on the renovation of the 1000 sq. ft. room destined to be a multi-purpose "Learning Center" at the East Trenton Community Center. Pete Gerster and Ray Nichols, coordinators of the construction efforts, are excited to report that the suspended ceiling and lighting fixtures have been completely installed, the electrical wiring is virtually completed, the rough plumbing is almost completed and the installation of sheetrock in the new lavatories has been started. Furthermore, both the skilled and "semi-skilled" volunteers have enjoyed the senses of accomplishment and camaraderie that working on this room provides.

Since we are only working on two Saturdays each month, we anticipate that it will be a few more months before the room is ready for use. Therefore there are still many opportunities to get involved in this project. Yet to be done:

- Construction of wooden valences to provide indirect lighting along one wall;
- Complete installation of sheet rock in the lavatories and kitchen area;
- Tape and spackle new sheetrock;
- Paint lavatories and kitchen area;
- Install luan (thin -plywood) sub-flooring and vinyl tiles for the floor;
- Install sheet vinyl in the two bathrooms;
- Install sinks and toilets in the lavatories;
- Install a kitchen counter with sink and cabinets above it;
- Install lavatory doors and replace one entry door;
- Install burlap covered Homosote (like in Founders' Room) on one wall;
- and Repair one broken windowpane.

The work will go faster if more members of the congregation volunteered. There are tasks for both skilled and unskilled volunteers. Many people are learning on the job. **The workdays are scheduled for the second and fourth Saturdays of every month.** For **December** the dates are the **8th** and **22nd**.

Covenant Circles - Revisited!

We have made some revisions to our Covenant Circle program based on the expressed needs and feedback of so many congregants who have been in Covenant Circles, as well as those who have not, but would like to try. The basic Covenant Circles that we have created over the past four years have been successful in creating community, encouraging spiritual growth, and inviting authentic connection with one another.



And yet, there is always room for improvement!

These are the changes that we are making to the basic

Covenant Circle:

- There will be time for discussion, questions, and socializing for the last 20 to 30 minutes of each Circle. (The previous format did not give enough opportunity for this.)
- Each Circle will be encouraged to get together socially a few times and/or work together on a social justice or service project.
- We will start with a fewer number of groups and grow new groups as needed during the year.
- Circles will now meet from year to year, although people can leave or join at the end of each year in June.

Looking ahead - *Peabody Sisters* by Megan Marshall.

Three sessions beginning March 19. *The Peabody Sisters*—Elizabeth Palmer Peabody (1804-1894), Mary Tyler Peabody Mann (1807-1887), and Sophia Amelia Peabody Hawthorne (1809-1871)—were champions of reform movements, pioneers in modern educational theory, founders of the kindergarten movement in America, and supporters of the arts. No less important was their function as central conduits in the small, complicated web of relationship that comprised the Transcendentalist movement, and the vital links they represented between institutional Unitarianism and its often estranged Transcendentalist offspring. This is a fascinating book which will increase your understanding of our Transcendentalist heritage.

Dinner Discussion

NOBEL LAUREATE TO SPEAK On Tuesday, **December 18**, the Dinner Discussion topic will be "**Binary Pulsars and Relativistic Gravity**," and our speaker will be **Joseph Taylor**. To most of us the night sky is a proliferation of dots of light arranged in fascinating patterns, replete with ancient mythology. But now come see it though the eyes and telescopes of Prof. Taylor, Princeton's James S. McDonnell Distinguished University Professor of Physics, Emeritus, and winner of the 1993 Nobel Prize in Physics. Prof. Taylor was born in Philadelphia to parents with deep Quaker roots and grew up on the family farm in Cinnaminson Township, New Jersey. He began with schoolboy experiments involving radio telescopes, and went on to the Moorestown Friends School and Haverford College, where his initial interest was mathematics. As early influences he credits *The Radio Amateur's Handbook* and books on radio astronomy and the mathematics of the Fourier transform. He went on to do research at Harvard and the University of Massachusetts before coming to Princeton. His research developed into the astrophysics of pulsars - neutron stars, the extremely dense, strongly magnetized, rapidly spinning remnants of supernova explosions, which appear to be nature's most precise clocks. Among other results, the experiments have demonstrated the existence of gravitational waves, as predicted by Einstein. Sign up with **Mal Durbin** between services Dec. 9 and Dec. 16. Board of Trustees

So...just what does your board do at its monthly meeting? Do you know when and where these meetings are?

The UUCP board meets in the Founders' Room the second Tuesday of every month. The meetings usually begin at 7 PM, but four times a year we arrive at 6:45 PM although the meeting doesn't officially start until 7:15 PM. That's so we have half an hour to hear any input that congregants would like to give us - about pretty much anything in a totally unstructured discussion. March 11 and July 14 are the remaining 6:45 PM input meetings. All board meetings are open to congregants, of course, but we'd particularly welcome you on those dates.

A week or so before our monthly meeting, our president Jeanne Carsten sends out by email an agenda and various attachments that we'll need to study ahead of time. The agenda is very precise - we're nothing if not organized! We typically have ten to twelve agenda items to discuss. A suggested time allotment is included for each item, and the agenda always has us ending by about 9:30 PM. Generally speaking, we go over on a few (especially the one for break and refreshments), and end up at about 10 PM. The agenda for our November meeting included such items as "financial audit update," "proposal for financial monitoring reports," and "building on the 2006-2007 communication plan." Pretty dry, huh?

The first two items on the agenda are never dry, however. Those are the "chalice lighting" and "check-in question." We take turns on these, and in the process have gotten to know each other better and made sure that each board meeting includes a contemplative or spiritual element as well. We thought it might be interesting for you to see some examples of the questions we

GREEN CORNER:

THE PLANETARY EMERGENCY

The latest UN climate report made it clear that we are at the beginning of a true Planetary Emergency. An interlocked set of crises are all accelerating and will affect us and many generations to come: global warming, hunger, disease, coming oil shortages, water wars, and extinctions of species.

The congregation of the UUCP, by becoming a Green Sanctuary, can help to deal with all of these problems locally; and in addition, the ten or twelve items seen frequently on lists of "What You Can Do" can help; but they are not nearly enough. We must also:

- 1) Get political. The federal government must act immediately and massively. We must demand that our elected representatives take action on global warming and peak oil. We must campaign for renewable energy and against dirty coal.
- 2) Go after big ticket items such as autos and home heating. Consider a plug-in hybrid or electric car, or move closer to your workplace. Consider installing solar panels and solar heating. Reduce air travel, reduce meat consumption, use efficient appliances, and conserve energy.
- 3) Work with local groups. Small in numbers, UU's can have a huge impact when we work with local groups such as Sustainable Princeton, the League of Women Voters, and the Sierra Club Cool Cities/Counties program.
- 4) Reduce consumption. Learn to live more simply. Buy foods and other goods grown and made near home to cut down on their transportation impacts.
- 5) Learn to live in harmony with nature. Restore natural areas. Introduce children to nature. Find in nature a source of spirituality. We conserve that which we love and it is vital that we not only respect nature as in our Seventh Principle but establish a loving bond with it.
- 6) Foster hope. Our mission is to create a zero carbon and zero waste world; communities with sustainable transportation, food, building materials, and water; natural areas and wildlife under restoration; equity, fair trade, and health and happiness for all. It will be the work of many generations to put this into place, but we can take a giant step today.

SPONSORS needed for 2008 Outreach Grants

The Social Outreach Committee (Mary Bryant, Lauren Foss, Corinne Reslier, Thaine Shetter, Diane Torrance and Amanda Gillum, chair) will meet during January and February to review applications and recommend grants for various agencies. Grants will be awarded in the Spring 2008.
