The Good News Reverend Bill Neely

A current article on UUWorld.org explores various responses to the question of “What character in a film or TV show best demonstrates UU values, and why?” The answers are fun: Pres. Bartlett on *West Wing*, Lisa on *The Simpsons*, Capt. Jean-Luc Picard on *Star Trek: The Next Generation*, Atticus Finch in *To Kill a Mockingbird*, and others. Earlier, I saw a friend post the question on Facebook and my response was Julia on *Designing Women*. She was always so fiery and fearless when her sense of justice was offended, and she frequently voiced support for people being disrespected by the powers-that-be. I’ve met many Julia’s in our faith. “Demonstrates UU values” can mean a million things, and Julia certainly demonstrates some of them.

The question and our responses demonstrate that “UU values” is so broad that how we answer really tells us about ourselves and how we see our faith. I immediately went to being a strong voice for justice. Others in the article went to, among other factors, how the character leads and embraces complexity (Bartlett), holds a

pragmatic faith (Lisa), is an idealist who is always trying to learn (Picard), and has a strong social conscience (Finch). If I had been in a different place when I read the question, say having just returned from a memorial service where I saw the congregation love and care for the family members of one who has died, I myself may have offered a different answer: maybe one of the characters in *Steel Magnolias* or the community that surrounds Tom Hanks and his partner in *Philadelphia*. Had I just returned from a youth group gathering upon seeing the question, I may have chosen one of the bright, talented, open-minded characters in *Glee*! Or, had I just returned from worship, perhaps Jodie Foster may have come to mind. She played the scientist in the movie *Contact* who, while witnessing the beauties of the cosmos and trying to describe them, can only say, “They should have sent a poet.”

Yes, all these and more demonstrate UU values, which are numerous and have multitudes of expressions. Together, we see not so much a character that reflects our values, as an ensemble that does so, and this ensemble better demonstrates who we are. We are a

collection of individuals with unique expressions joined in covenant with one another to create the living tradition that is our faith. Our answers indicate isolated characters, but the good news is that Unitarian Universalism doesn’t really work that way. We are not isolated as individuals, but animated in a changing and dynamic community. We are an ensemble of diverse, gifted, and dedicated people making our lives and the world a kinder, more compassionate, and more just place. Who best represents UU values? We do. Not you. Not me. But together, we do.

The **early morning shift** sets out the cups, tea bags, sweeteners (at about **8:45 AM** if you want to attend the 9:15 service). After the first coffee hour, refresh the milk and cup supply and tidy up the coffee area a little. (Buying and bringing milk is also a task for morning shift.)

The **noon shift** unplugs the urns at about **12:40**, takes all the used cups to the dishwasher, puts away the tea bags and sweeteners, and rinses out the urns.

Early morning shift is easy because Jorge Garcia Salas makes the coffee in the big urns (the only large task) and noon shift is helped by Ethan Allen who (most Sundays) runs the cups through the dishwasher and puts them away in conjunction with the brunch makers and cleaner-uppers.

A new angle, to introduce new people to our cooperative efforts, is that long-standing members sign up to do a coffee shift and are assigned a new person to partner with (which encourages new persons signing up to do it.)

An addition this year would be to put names of coffee volunteers in Happenings. Because it's Universal, you may only have to do coffee volunteering once a year! ~Carol Allen, Coordinator

Our "Hymn of the Month" for October is No. 53, "I Walk the Unfrequented Road." The music is by John Wyeth, a Unitarian from Cambridge, MA. The tune is from his *Repository of Sacred Music* published in 1813 for Methodists and Baptists to the west and south. The text author is Frederick Lucian Hosmer (1840-1929), a Unitarian minister who served congregations in five states. Beginning in 1875 and continuing for nearly four decades, he and William Channing Gannett worked together, making a contribution to hymnody comparable to that of the "two Sams," Longfellow and Johnson.

Jim has brought his contemporary and multicultural music to more than 500 UU Churches over 27 years. 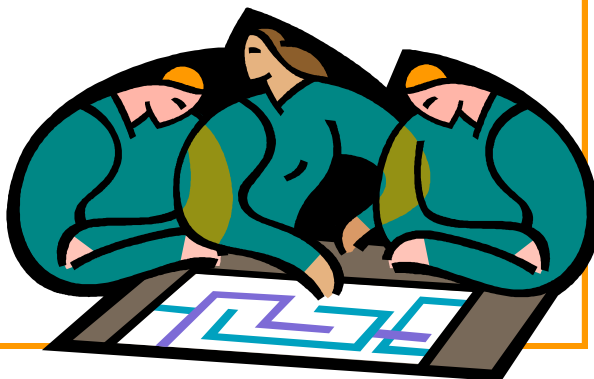
