It is so good to be back with all of you. I have been catching up with many of you and with many committees in these past three weeks and look forward to the continuation of the wonderful work that you have been doing in our various ministries including our new initiatives with a relational covenant, the master plan, and the green sanctuary.

My sabbatical was very rich in fallow time, reflective time and creative time, and I thank you all again for that opportunity. I actually spent a lot of the time integrating pieces of my past into my life, moving towards a greater wholeness.

I entirely emptied a basement that had been filled with the odds and ends of thirty seven years of marriage, giving much of it away, throwing away some, and keeping some few things that I hadn't seen for decades, like early letters from JD. During February, I spent two weeks with seventeen relatives in Selma Alabama, my father's hometown, hearing old stories, visiting childhood sites, playing cards and looking at photos. I reconnected with an old high school friend which included the perhaps always somewhat painful trip down the memory lane of high school. And I spent two weeks in Costa Rica with two women from a previous women's spirituality group that had been important in my life. We immersed ourselves in the sacred rhythm of the natural world, with various nature tours and walks and boat trips and watching the lunar eclipse from a mountain top.

It was also a time for re-
newing my spiritual practices. I

started weekly yoga classes again, meditation and daily prayer, which as I mentioned in my sermon last week, is totally new for me. Using the model of the poet, Rainer Rilke's Book of Hours, I find that if one uses no preconceived metaphor, it is in the act of writing or speaking to God, that the relational metaphors and images emerge. It can be a powerful way to connect with the divine in oneself, in others and in the world.

The sabbatical was an inspiring and a renewing six months that will enrich my ministry and my work in partnership with all of you in many ways. One immediate way, is that I would love to learn Spanish and in a model that has been used by some diversity committees in other UU churches, we will be starting a "learn to speak Spanish" group. Our hope is to meet weekly. And the best part is that we already have a native Spanish speaking teacher who will also help us shape the course as we go along, perhaps even scheduling visitors and trips. Again, it is so good to be back and thank you for this important time of renewal.

I wanted to share with you the vows Jill and I shared with each other.

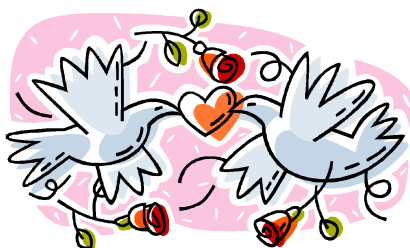

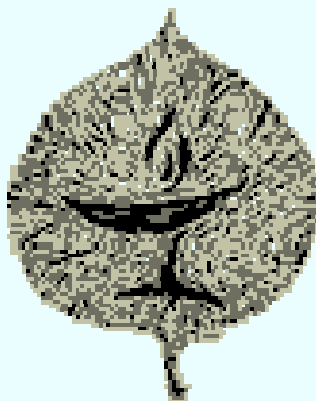

August and hope to start meeting in September. Each person will be asked to contribute 5-6 dollars a session for Jorge's time. It might be great to keep it open to all ages, so that some parents and children might like to learn together. Also it doesn't matter if you already know some Spanish or are totally new.

This will actually be the third language that I have learned here in the congregation, the other two being Hebrew (with the Bible class) and Hungarian (with the partner church group). ~Chris Reed

Cakes for the Queen of Heaven – Back by Popular Demand

This nine session program for women explores the feminine divine in ancient paganism, Judaism, Christianity and finally new earth-based aspects of contemporary religion. We traditionally offered this every fall and many women's spirituality groups were born from the program. One of the reasons for the program's importance and success is that it offers women an opportunity to heal from having grown up female within patriarchal religion. This opportunity that we extend towards each other ends up being powerful in many ways, relationally and creatively, as well as spiritually.

Our format contains creative ritual, check-in and participational exploring of the feminine divine. We share leadership for various rituals or exercises, greatly enriching the program. I use the basic structure of the original Cakes, but I continue to update the content with the most recent works of feminist theology and creative ritual, always keeping the best, like the Donna Reed films and the writings of Merlin Stone.

Cakes will start in September, and meet EITHER on the second and fourth Thursday nights, 7-8:45pm. OR the first and third Sunday evenings 7-8:45. When you sign up PLEASE indicate whether Thursdays or Sundays are better for you, and if you could do either. Thank you.

A New Earth and Awakening to our True Selves: A Small Group Discussion and Personal Exploration

Eckhart Tolle's insights about living in the present are playing a growing role in bringing awareness to human consciousness. His best selling books *The Power of Now* and *A New Earth* are changing human consciousness. Recently, Oprah featured a webcast educational seminar discussing *A New Earth*, which reached more than 11 million people worldwide.

Using a format similar to our covenant circles, this new UUCP Adult Program will utilize readings from *A New Earth*. However, emphasis will be placed on using the readings as signposts to the underlying experience of presence and spiritual development.

According to The Modern Library websites: In 1932, Stein began writing the 'autobiography' of her longtime friend and companion, Alice B. Toklas. The book, an immediate bestseller, guaranteed them both a place in history. An account of their life together in Paris before, during, and after World War I, it is full of the atmosphere of the changing life of the city and of idiosyncratic glimpses of such figures as Matisse, Picasso, Braque, Cocteau, Apollinaire, Pound, Eliot, Hemingway, and other luminaries and aspirants who were their close friends. But at the center of the narrative there is always the titanic figure of Gertrude Stein, the self-proclaimed 'first-class genius' who some dismissed as the 'Mother Goose of Montparnasse,' presiding over her celebrated residence-salon-art gallery at 27, rue de Fleurus. William Troy remarked about her: 'It is not flippant to say that if she had not come to exist . . . it would be necessary to invent Miss Gertrude Stein

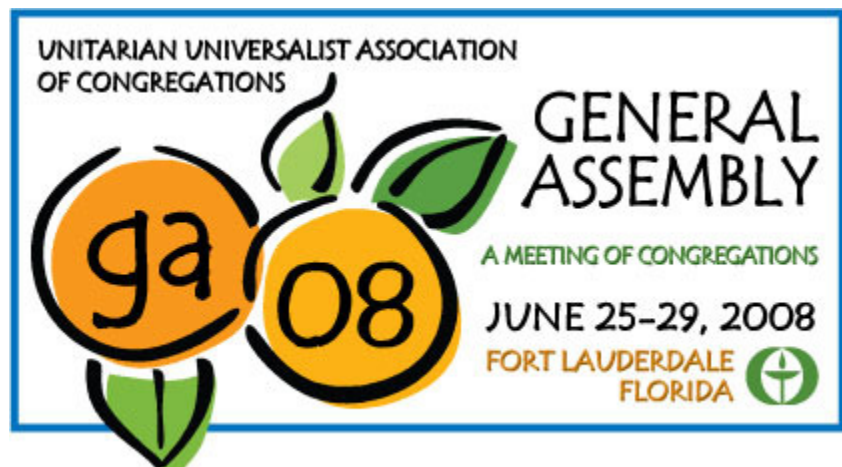
UU Connections Committee

**Relational Covenant Reflection

My knickers were, without question, in a twist!

Having dutifully "signed in" at the blood testing lab, I waited and waited for some sign that the totally impassive, otherwise occupied, completely uninterested but omnipotent god of the lab was aware that I existed.

Her blindness was sublime. Being the sole patient, perhaps the interference of my body on the rhythm of the long line of empty chairs was hard to detect.

I feel the stirrings of irritation expanding.

Am I invisible?

At last, I am summoned. There is no greeting. No cheery, "May I help you?"

I deliver my prescription.

And the god of the lab spoke: "I can't do this test. There's no diagnostic code in this prescription. You'll have to go back to the doctor's office and get the diagnostic code."

I am resentful, vexed and full of wrath! Underneath all that (and harder to admit), I am hurt at not being taken care of.

I take a deep breath. I had just finished reading Marshall Rosenberg's book, "Non Violent Communication"*. Surely I had learned something that could be useful here.

Another deep breath and I was able to murmur, "It must make it hard for you when people don't fill in the forms correctly."

For the first time, she looked at me. And she could see me. Because I had, in that instant, been able to see her. Suddenly I was some-one who understood that her job was not easy; that she was frustrated by other people's negligence.

And with a smile she said, "Tell you what – I can call the doctor's office and they can give me the code over the phone." And she did. And both of us felt great!

What a revelation!

I must confess, my motivation in recognizing her frustration was not, at the beginning, compassion. It was, on some level, an awareness that neither one of us was pleased with the way this transaction was proceeding. But as soon as I had that expectation of myself – that I cared about what her needs might be -- I actually began to care. And she responded as all gods and mortals do. We all want to be cared about and we feel good when we care about others.

And this is the basis upon which our Relational Covenant will rest.

Next fall, in the Relational Covenant exercise, we will be exploring how we want to be with one another and how we can keep this consciousness fresh in our minds so that we can access our compassionate natures when things do not go smoothly.

**Building a Relational Covenant
at UUCP**

Planning now underway

Plans for developing a UUCP relational covenant are currently taking shape, following a recommendation to the Executive Team last spring by the Committee on Ministry (COM). Interested current and former members of the COM (**Cathy Stolle**, **Dana Powsner** and **Sharon McCrae**) and a representative of the Adult Programs Committee (**Michele Ochsner**) have formed a Relational Covenant Task Force to work with **Forrest Gilmore** on planning UUCP's process for developing what we are calling a relational (rather than behavioral) covenant. Other UUCP members (**Ted Fetter**, **Pete Gerster**, and **Kathy Taylor**) have agreed to be advisors/consultants on this process.

Such a "relational covenant" is a congregational vow that describes how we promise to be in relationship with one another rather than describing behavior that we will not tolerate in our community.

What this process will look like

UUCP's relational covenant will be important in our congregational life only to the extent that it is forged through a process that provides meaningful opportunities to reflect on and discuss what we need, want and value in our relationships within this congregation. Like the process used for developing a mission statement, we will use a worship service, congregational workshops and intimate "cottage meetings" to explore these questions together.

Timing

We will begin the covenant development process this fall with a worship service on September 21 that will be followed closely by an all-congregation workshop on October 4. At subsequent meetings, we will share ideas, draft and refine our consensus

covenant statement. Most of these meetings and special events will be planned for fall and early winter. This will give us several months to live and work with the covenant before it comes up for ratification at our annual meeting in June 2009. By that point we hope to have a relational covenant statement that the congregation fully “owns” and can enthusiastically support.

So, why undertake this process at this particular point in our congregational life?

First of all, our relationships are, in fact, the foundation for much of what we do. We believe that this process can encourage fuller and more effective participation in pursuing our vision and mission, not only in our work within UUCP, but also in our outreach ministry in the broader community. Creating a forum for conversation on this topic will help build more authentic and trusting relationships between congregants. After all, we don’t relate to “a community”—our sense of community is based on our individual relationships. By involving UUCP congregants in thinking through and talking about how we relate to each other, we may be able to expand the number of people who truly believe that they have found a close and meaningful community here.

Secondly, it is much easier to create a covenant about how we relate at a time when our congregational life is NOT experiencing conflict. In developing a relational covenant during a period without conflict, we are laying the groundwork for dealing with difficult situations that may arise in the future. As the Committee on Ministry noted: “A covenant’s goal is to call us into being the people we seek to be even when we don’t understand each other and we don’t agree.”

We are all human – we will not be our best selves in every moment.

And, since we are all human and may occasionally lapse in our good intentions, a relational covenant will serve as a reminder of the promises we make to one another, promises that reflect the respect and love we wish to give and receive in our beloved community.

Covenants are an exciting tool that can help ground us in the sacred work of building community within and beyond our congregation.

Interfaith Event Honors the Earth with Films and a “Meet the Trees” Walk

Members of five Princeton-area houses of worship gathered on the Princeton University campus to attend an earth celebration on the first Sunday afternoon in May, 2008.

The event began with the film *Everything’s Cool*, an expose of the ways in which the current U.S. administration has attempted to cover up the seriousness of global warming and the urgency of taking steps to deal with it.

Simultaneously, two films were shown for children. One was *The Man Who Planted Trees*, a moving fictional story about a man who single-handedly reforested a large area of treeless land by simply going out and planting tree seedlings every day. The other was *Ryan’s Well*, a true story about a boy’s successful campaign to secure clean drinking water for a population in Africa.

A discussion following the adult film centered on the question how we can best move our government to promptly take significant steps to reduce the nation’s greenhouse gas emissions and to assist other nations in doing the same.

There followed an interlude by Cantor Murray Simon of the Jewish Center. Rabbi Simon offered Hebrew prayers celebrating the earth and then sang a song about the tree of life, traditionally used to conclude celebrations.

The last event of the day was a walk on the Princeton campus. Walkers were encouraged to look at trees both with “hard vision,” learning to identify the species, and with “soft vision,” relating to the trees from the heart. A highlight of the walk

was a yoga session beneath one of the campus’s largest trees, led by yoga teacher Andrea Sacchetti.

The event was organized by members of Princeton’s Nassau Presbyterian, Trinity Episcopal, and Unitarian Universalist churches. Attendees included congregants from these churches as well as members of the Jewish Center, Princeton Friends, and Princeton Yoga.

Participants expressed the hope that this would be the first of many annual “Celebrate the Earth” events. Banding together, houses of worship can strongly encourage their congregations and neighbors to celebrate the earth and be good stewards of it.

The Green Sanctuary Committee meets at 7:30 pm on the first Tuesday of every month in Room 15. Its mission: to work to make UUCP’s building and grounds, and its members’ lifestyles, more sustainable.
