Reflection Reverend Chris Reed

Before jumping into the transitions and changes brought on by fall and those brought on by a change in our congregation's ministry, I find myself taking a last breath of summer.

Summers always seem to offer some time of renewal. I have started meditating again, although in a more eclectic manner than when I first started some ten years ago (I don't always sit for half an hour, and sometimes I don't even close my eyes). And I took a canoeing trip with my brothers, that was so wonderful, so filled with stories and laughter, biking and meditative lake vistas and stillness, that we have all decided to buy a summer place together.

In the midst of this stillness and calm, Rev. Meg Barnhouse arrived in August, and brings with her a kind of attentiveness to one's inner life, that makes for a healthy congregation and a healthy staff.

This fall we are engaged in two great congregational efforts. All the work that our congregation has done in the last three years, putting our current "policy governance" in place, with no little confusion and some frustrations, has brought us to a new place as a congregation. Our mission and our statements about what difference we want to make in the world, are now linked to our program life, with tangible ways to measure our progress.

And this fall, we start the search for a new parish minister with some education around the search process, and then the election of a search committee in October.

There is much excitement and opportunity for growth and change as we engage in these two great congregational efforts and in the transition work that Meg will be doing with us. Yet in the midst of this approaching activity, this last breath of summer invites me to think of the circles of stillness and calm and deep connection that make up our small group ministry.

This fall we have added a men's spirituality circle and a women's spirituality circle, to our scriptures reading circle and our newcomers' circle, and covenant circles. We encourage all to participate in some kind of small group, in which we invite deep listening and a valuing of the sacred within each other, that is at the heart of spiritual community.

Welcome, Meg! Welcome to all newcomers and guests! Welcome to all who are returning after summer adventures! Bring your small container of water that symbolizes some meaningful experience of your summer to our Water Blessing on September 13, so that we might again welcome one another!

Reflection
Reverend Meg Barnhouse

I have been looking forward to being here, to beginning our work together.

Imagine my chagrin when, in my very first communication with the congregation, the Constant Contact software left in the strange little sentences about what good customers you all were. Maybe it was the full moon, I don't know. After a little cussing, I decided to be glad that it happened because it gives me an opportunity to tell you how I *don't* think about you.

Congregation members and friends aren't customers at all, even though sometimes we get mixed up and start acting as if that's true, as if we can sample what the congregation has to offer, dip in and out, evaluate from a distance, have a stance of demanding satisfaction or taking our energy and going away.

The Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Princeton at its best is not a group of users or buyers. It is an association of participants. We associate together because it's enjoyable, it gives us a group to be part of, it's a piece of our identity, we get to know people we can talk to, people with whom we can think and feel together. We have shared experiences of striving, sorrow, fun and mystery, we witness one another's spiritual deepening, and we join our hands together to do the work of binding up the broken hearted and setting the captives free. Customers? Far from it.

Antoine St. Exupery said:

“If you want to build a ship
 Don't herd people together to
 collect wood
 And don't assign them tasks and
 work,
 But rather teach them to long for
 the
 Endless immensity of the sea.”

What do you long for?
 Among my tasks as Interim Minister is to hear your vision of the congregation you would like to see. Is it a ship on the immense sea carrying people who are on their way to a shared destination? Is it a school where we learn together? Is it an oasis where we rest and are nourished for our journeys out into the wild lands? Is it a coffeehouse where we enjoy hanging out, conversing and solving the problems of the universe with ideas? Is it a filling station where we get the fuel to burn as we work to make our families, our workplaces and our town a better place? Is it a work team on a bus with bad shock absorbers making stops along with way to teach a kid, dig a well, make things fairer?

There are many ways to think of a congregation. This one already has a Mission Covenant and some exciting Ends Policies which describe its destination. You can read those on the web site, UUPrinceton.org. We will be talking not only about your vision for the congregation's destination, but about how we want to get there -- not only about those things, but about where the congregation has been and how it exists in the world. Did you know that a congregational system is greater than the sum of the individuals who are in it? Each congregation has a personality, a way of doing things, almost as if it were an individual itself. We are going to look at the face of the congregation, the personality of the system. It's hard to do, because we are so close to it and we all have different angles of view. We'll take our time, treat one another with kindness and grace, and have some fun along the way.

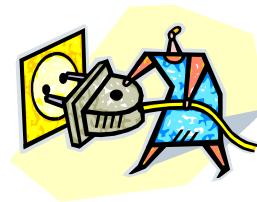

While no two classes are likely to be the same, classes are not cumulative; the point is the “practice” rather than the “education.”

Participants should wear loose, comfortable clothing and bring a sticky mat if possible. (A few mats are available from instructor, so don't let that stop you.) If you have other yoga gear and want to bring it, of course you're welcome to do that. Like all Adult RE classes at UUCP, this class is offered at no charge.

ACIM group is sponsoring an all day workshop in Holotropic breath work on Saturday October 3rd in Moorestown with the experienced trainer Jane Darton and her co-facilitator Lisa Heck. Both are licensed psychologists. The workshop will run from 11AM to 5PM with a brief break for lunch. We will organize a car pool from the Church to the workshop. The cost is between \$150 and \$135 per person depending on the number signing up. The maximum number that can be accommodated is 10.

Holotropic breath work is a non-drug method of expanding conscious awareness to include the spiritual domain. Sanislav and Christina Grof developed this method after Stan's years of work with terminally ill patients in the Maryland Psychiatric Hospital. The non-drug method consists of controlled breathing, music, relaxation and support from the facilitators that could include mild body work. Each person gets help in self exploration of the experience from the facilitators. Common unconscious domains that may be remembered include personal biographical memories, birth and pre-birth memories, and transpersonal experiences of various kinds.

Habitat for Humanity Work Continues.

The need for safe, affordable housing in Trenton remains great.

UUCP volunteers helped Habitat for Humanity provide such homes on July 11, when **Rusty Bryant, Thaine Shetter, Eleanor Hayes Larson, Judith Hayes, Ben Powsner Krejci** (with one arm in a cast), **Pete Gerster**, and **Ray Nichols** worked on a couple older townhouses that Habitat is rehabilitating. While most of us were upstairs, painting walls and ceilings, Ben and Eleanor cleaned up the basement of one townhouse and installed a new floor of interlocking plastic tiles that will provide a new basement floor about 3/4 inch above the old poured concrete floor. This will provide the new home owners with a nice smooth, dry basement floor.

completed the final exterior work on the five new townhouses that volunteers from UUCP had been helping to build for over a year. These final touches included the installation of fences between the back yards and the planting of gardens by Mercer Master Gardeners, as well as the paving of two parking spaces behind each home. After a long wait for the Trenton Building Inspectors to come and make the necessary Final Inspections, the homes received their final Certificates of Occupancy. Our Partner Family was finally able to move into their new home on August 5!

Also this summer, Habitat started the construction of a new duplex on what had been a vacant lot near the East Trenton Center. Educational Testing Service has pledged to provide much of the funding for its construction. As of August 8th, the concrete work for the foundations and basement walls had been completed and the decking for the first floor installed. Assuming that work passes inspection in the next few weeks, UUCP volunteers may be called upon to help erect the walls when we next go to in Trenton, on Saturday, September 12.

Volunteers are welcome regardless of experience. We are always happy to have more folks join us. Tools and supervision are provided. The rewards and personal satisfaction of using ones hands to help build these homes is great. The opportunities to learn new, practical skills are many, as are the chances to get to know other UUCP members a lot better. We guarantee that you will feel good at the end of the day about what you accomplished.

In our front entry garden we plant what rabbits and deer don't destroy, and in the courtyard what the collected sun and intense heat will allow. In the surrounds of the building we take out rampant weedy vines and unwanted tree seedlings, and on the building we work to keep the "ivy look" under control.

In May we arranged for a tree service to trim many of our big trees. They removed weak and dead wood, whole trees in some cases, mostly to avoid accidents and damage. It was esthetically useful as well, and will promote healthy growth.

Indoor plants needed editing, pruning, cleaning, and moving—and thanks to Jorge Garcia for help with all that.

A wonderful group of volunteers has been assembled by the Board to serve as the Interim Ministry Advisory Committee (IMAC): **Sally Easter**, **Peter Macholdt**, **Judi Marks**, **Cathy Stolle**, **Dana Powsner**, **Tom Prusa**, and **Jordan Corn**. This group of past and present congregational leaders will provide its insight and experience to Meg Barnhouse during her ministry, especially in the early months. The UUA recommended that this committee

be formed to provide our Interim Minister ready access to a broad spectrum of experienced UUCPers who are not now serving in other leadership capacities. None of the IMAC members are currently on the Board of Trustees, Leadership Council, Committee on Ministry, nor nominated for the Ministerial Search Committee. The IMAC sponsored a reception for Rev. Meg Barnhouse following her first Sunday in the pulpit, August 9, 2009.

There will be a Congregational Meeting on October 4th between the services to approve the Ministerial Search Committee. The 2008-2009 Nominating Committee extended its work into the early summer months to identify a group of members who were willing to take on the important commitment of finding our next settled parish minister. The proposed slate will be circulated, as required by our bylaws, at least 2 weeks in advance of the meeting. Formal notification of the meeting will also follow shortly.

In the coming months, the Board will be considering a variety of other issues relating to the ministries of the congregation. Under the leadership of Rev. Barnhouse, the Trustees will be helping to foster the congregational conversations about the future shape of our administrative and ministerial leadership. More about this will be forthcoming in future weeks. The Board will also be looking again at our Bylaws with the intention of clarifying the role of COM as we move forward with Policy Governance and during the period of ministerial transitions. The Leadership Leaves program will also be examined by the Trustees in coming months.

All five pieces in the set are settings of the verse of 17th century English poet and courtier George Herbert, who was admired by metaphysical poets of the time, such as Samuel Johnson and John Donne. Hymn # 89 is based on the 4th from the set of the "Five Mystical Songs," they're entitled, *The Call*.
